Active and Passive Voice

When the subject of a verb performs the action, the verb is in the active voice. When the subject receives the action, the verb is in the passive voice.

ACTIVE Olivia **bought** a bag of oranges. [The subject, *Olivia*, performs the action.]

PASSIVE The bag of oranges was bought by Olivia. [The subject, bag, receives the action.]

A transitive verb in the active voice often has both an indirect object and a direct object. When such a verb is put in the passive voice, either object can become the subject. The other object may serve as a complement called a retained object.

ACTIVE Mr. Jenkins read the class a short story.

PASSIVE A short story was read to the class by Mr. Jenkins.

PASSIVE The class was read a short story.

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Using and Revising the Passive Voice

- The passive voice should be used sparingly. Use the passive voice in the following situations:
 - (1) when you do not know the performer of the action
 - (2) when you do not want to reveal the performer of the action
 - (3) when you want to emphasize the receiver of the action
